## Risk Assessment for Play parks and Skate Park – Covid19 secure

Risk Assessment is a systematic general examination of the activities of the Parish Council to enable potential risk to be identified. The Parish Council, based on the recorded assessment, will take all practical and necessary steps to reduce or eliminate the risk identified. This document has been produced to enable Church Fenton Parish Council to assess the risk inherent to its activities and satisfy itself that it has taken all reasonable steps to minimise them and particularly to ensure our facilities are Covid19 secure.

The Government recently announced that Play Parks could be re-opened from 4 July 2020 and subsequently produced guidance offering "practical advice on how these can be reopened and managed effectively to enable their use while minimising the transmission risk of COVID-19". The guidance includes a requirement to "carry out an appropriate COVID-19 risk assessment". It is made very clear that "Failure to complete a risk assessment which takes account of COVID-19, or completing a risk assessment but failing to put in place sufficient measures to manage the risk of COVID-19, could constitute a breach of health and safety law". On that basis, this Risk Assessment takes each of the Key Principles as set out in the guidance and assesses whether or not practical arrangements can be put in place in the context of the two open access Play Parks in Church Fenton.
